Question and explore


Understand and analyze



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Your essay should be submitted with the following points in mind:

- Change the Share/Edit settings so that each of the following teachers have "can edit" rights: Mr. Baden, Mr.
 Morelock, Mrs. Keel, and Mrs. Streeter (email one of us if you don't know how to do this or view the video on the homepage of the Schoology course)
- Originality is important. Your doc will be submitted on TurnItln.com to check for originality. Make it real and make
 it yours. Your sourced material should account for no more than 10% of the writing. The rest should be original.
- Your essay should total 500-750 words
- Don't forget to turn in your paper by submitting it to the Schoology assignment by the due date (watch the video on the homepage of the Schoology course for directions on how to submit)
- 3. **Assignment 3:** (100 points) NY Times Opinion Page: Close Reading & Critical Analysis (CRCA)

For this assignment you will do a close reading and critical analysis of opinion articles from the New York Times or other approved news agencies (<u>Wall Street Journal</u> or <u>The Independent</u>). <u>WSJ Student Subscription rate</u> (optional).

ARTICLE SELECTION PROCEDURES

- 1. TWO articles have been provided for you
 - a. <u>Protectionism Spreads Disease</u>
 - b. <u>Is Burnout Real?</u>
- 2. Find TWO articles on your own and PRINT them.

For ALL articles

- 1. Go to <u>NYT Opinion Page</u> or other news agency site (see above)
- 2. Review the Lens Diagram on page 1 of this document and identify the focus areas on the diagram (environmental, scientific, economic, political and historical, etc.) which pertain to the article you are reading
- 3. Read and annotate each article using <u>slowreads annotation methods</u>. You must have **at least 10** annotations for each article.
- 4. Identify the focus area of as one of your annotations on each article
- 5. Your will be scored based on the holistic quality of your interactions with the texts (implications and significance is better than 'neat' or 'I didn't know that' [WHY is it neat? WHY are you interested in knowing this now? How does this connect to your existing ideas/schema about this topic or issue?]).

CRITICAL ANALYSIS PROCEDURES

- 1. Open the Critical Analysis Template and rename it: "2019 AP Seminar SUMMER CRCA Your Name"
- 2. Choose two of the four articles to write a Critical Analysis
- 3. FOR EACH ARTICLE YOU HAVE CHOSEN (You will do this 2 times in the same document)

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- a. Identify the issue(s) and positions presented in the article and how they connect to the specific category on the Lens Diagram
- b. Discuss the perspective of the author and his/her key arguments
- c. Properly utilize at least 2 quotes from the article for support
- d. Discuss what makes the author a credible source on the subject
- 4. During the first week of the new school year we will have a <u>Socratic Seminar</u>. You may wish to review what that may look like.
- 5. Turn in your Critical Analysis writing by submitting it to the Schoology assignment by the due date (watch the video on the homepage of the Schoology course for directions on how to submit)
